2017 has been another extremely positive year for PiP. We've spent time considering and **planning for our future**, as well as working out what we'll need to get there.

Although we've continued to welcome new students, we are now **at full**

capacity. At the same time, demand for our excellent services continues. Crucially, the requirements of many new students demonstrate the need for progressive and intensive support, along with new facilities.

Having taken the decision to explore *the concept of expansion*, we have now designed an exciting new project with an increased vocational focus. The priority now is to find the right premises and ensure there are sufficient resources to get it up and running. **Project Beanstalk is our most ambitious endeavour to date.** When operational, it will enable us to double the number of people we support.

Fruitful, our original juice stall, represents Beanstalk perfectly. Run by the people we support, it focuses on employment, communication, financial and literacy skills, and community integration. It is the perfect way for PiP students to demonstrate their skills and really make a difference. The project has been a huge success, and is the **perfect vehicle to raise awareness** about our cause and the great work we do.

I'm lucky: each day I get to see first hand the excellent quality of PiP's work. The amazing creativity, uniqueness and general disposition of PiP students is simply inspirational. The **impact of our work** is so positive and clear, and that's in large part due to our dedicated and caring staff and volunteers, who all make such a meaningful difference in the lives of the people we support.

Looking ahead, I'm excited to see **PiP's continued development**. And it's wonderful to look back on a year that once again demonstrated how well we've met the needs of the people we serve.

PiP – Pursuing Independent Paths – encourages and empowers adults with learning disabilities to reach their full potential. We are a small grassroots charity in London, with big ideas. All our activities focus on promoting choice, participation and independence.

Time to empower

Fruitful is our flagship project. This social enterprise is a concept that's really taken off, and encapsulates all we do at PiP. The Fruitful stall is managed by our trainees, and offers fresh juices made by our students using produce grown in our Fruitful garden, and served with a smile. Our vision is that the stall will operate at local street food markets, other community events and corporate partner offices.

Fruitful is a great way for our trainees with learning disabilities to develop core skills; to gain invaluable life, healthy living, communication and vocational skills; and take a full and active place in the community. We have developed a structured training programme to help them achieve set goals and objectives on customer service, hygiene, juice preparation, marketing and money skills. It's also very important for our students to show the world their talent and how they can be a valuable asset to any organisation as a paid employee.

Marcio attends three Fruitful sessions a week. On Tuesdays he juices and helps come up with new exciting flavours. On Wednesdays he and the other trainees devise new ideas for content they would like to put on their Fruitful website. On Fridays, Marcio works towards his Asdan 'Workright' accreditation. He works so hard on the project and really enjoys being part of the events we attend. They act as a real focus for him. The Fruitful project is just perfect for Marcio who struggles with concentration in a classroom setting. The routine of tasks when juicing or serving at an event really work to Marcio's strengths and he has shown so much improvement within the sessions.


